#### Juleah del Rosario Swanson Identity at Play: Racial and Ethnic Identity Theory in Libraries and Classrooms

Librarians and educators are being asked critical questions about their own role in moving forward as an inclusive and diverse community for students, patrons, and teens. Who is represented in our collections? Who is reflected as gatekeepers in publishing, libraries, and classrooms? But why is representation in a book or in the real world so impactful to teens? Racial and ethnic identity theory can help us begin to articulate the "why". It can begin to illustrate what might be at play when teens "see themselves" in the books they read, reflected in the librarians they interact with, and the teachers they encounter. This presentation will apply the framework of racial and ethnic identity theory to better recognize, understand, and support experiences and interactions with students, patrons, and teens.

Juleah del Rosario Swanson is an assistant professor and librarian at the University of Colorado, Boulder with a research focus on professional, racial, and ethnic identity of librarians of color. She is also the author of a forthcoming young adult novel to be published by Simon & Schuster in fall 2018 titled 500 Words or Less about a high school senior who writes her Ivy League-obsessed classmates' college admissions essays.



#### Kimberly Reid Writing Realistic Fiction

There is no shortage of ideas for writers of realistic fiction. We can mine our lives for inspiration, but novelists don't simply report the stories of other people or retell our own. We make things up, even when they sound a lot like the truth. We'll discuss the elements of writing that turn real-life events into marketable realistic fiction: finding the story's hook, nailing the setting, and placing ordinary characters in real-world situations that readers will care enough about to go along for the ride.

So, you wrote a book. Now what? Do you shop for an agent, submit to editors, or do it on your own? This session will explore the pros and cons of the ever-evolving indie publishing world. Discussions on which platform to use, what expenses you should budget for, and how to build a marketing plan will help you take charge of your publishing career. Join these award-winning and multi-published authors as they share their experiences and knowledge with you. The members of POESIA, a teen critique writing group, have been indie published for two years and are currently working on their third book. Between them all, they have published over twenty-five novels and anthologies. As indie authors, the POESIA group not only has experience in writing and publishing, but also in marketing and cover design.
